Spelling at Leechpool

Spelling is certainly tricky and one of the most challenging jobs is teaching children how to spell. The English language contains well over a million words and has been affected by some 1,300 years of history. The National Curriculum highlights, "most people read words more accurately than they spell them. The younger the pupils are, the truer this is." In 2017, only 13% of pupils nationally were able to correctly spell the word 'coarse' in the SATs taken that year.

Our teachers are finding that the pupils are not remembering key patterns or rules no matter how well it was initially taught and after carefully analysing our spelling data across the school, we have decided to embark on a new whole school spelling approach with the aim of increasing the amount of information committed pupils' long-term to memories.

One reason could be down to Hermann Ebbinghaus' theory of the "forgetting curve". This is the idea that if we do not revisit learned information then, over time, the likelihood of us remembering that information will be drastically reduced.

Our new approach to spelling constantly revisits new and already taught spelling patterns and rules and ensures that children do not have the opportunity to forget. The approach is also about enabling pupils to see the magic of words-the patterns that sparkle inside them and how word wizardry can help transform the quality of their writing to new enchanting heights that will keep a reader spellbound. We aim to foster a future generation of curious, excited spellers who enjoy finding patterns in the baffling complexities of English spelling.
