Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	95%	We have used our sports premium to support our swimmers. This has meant that we have only three pupils in year 6 that cannot swim 25 metres.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	95%	We have worked hard to establish swimming at Leechpool with a variety of year groups going swimming throughout the year. We have year 5, 4,3 and 3 swimming as well as our year 6 swimmers who have not achieved 25 metres.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	95%	Each term the children take part in life saving swimming skills where they learn about safe self-rescue in a variety of situations.

Have you done this?	Yes	Yes, we have used the sports premium to support this and it has been very successful with 95% of year 6 swimming 25 metres.
Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	Yes	Staff are present when the swim teachers deliver the swimming lessons. The staff make notes about the lessons and feed this back to one another to build on their knowledge.
